n "Unparalleled success" was a quote typical of the many accolades I heard to describe the inaugural running of Australia's newest aviarion event. The country's famous 'Sunshine State' of Queensland lived up to its name for the weekend of 27th-28th August, and the days preceding, with stunning clear, calm and warm conditions. Visitors got to enjoy a broad range of great aerial performances from a collection of rare vintage Moths ("The geriatric de Havillands"), through to numerous warbirds displays, aerobatics, ex-military jets, all the way through to the RAAF's huge C-17 Globemaster transport, all of which came together for the first serious airshow event to be held in southern Queensland for years.

The range of aircraft gathered for the event was extremely broad, and the number of exotic machines parked in the static display line-ups reminded us that this airshow has been built on the foundation of years of very successful fly-ins. Although technically a brand new event on the downunder airshow landscape, the inaugural Brisbane Valley Airshow has had the advantage of attracting a broad body of high calibre support from the aviation communities of south east Queensland who'd previously worked on the more relaxed Festival of Flight weekends, the Gathering of Eagles fly-ins etc. hosted at the historic Watts Bridge Memorial Airfield. This represents over two decades of experience in managing logistics, food provision, traffic management etc., resulting in a first time airshow that felt as though it was run by professionals 'from the get-go'.

Organisers were careful to provide all the elements of family fun entertainment coupled with a flying programme that for the most part flowed freely and well. A few unexpected elements included such things as the classic twin-engined twin-tailed Morava flying in formation alongside the L-39 jet. This saw a few bewildered faces amongst the aviation fraternity until the penny dropped that these were both Czech-Aero products. Excellent commentary from announcers John Knox (Snr. & Jnr.) joined the dots for those who hadn't! The very pleasing sight of R-2000-powered Yak-3U 'Steadfast' flanked by two Mustangs made an enticing presentation before the Yak split
